We at Siloam Missionary Homes believe we are to go into all the world to preach the Gospel, and we are to be given to hospitality and taking care of the needs of the saints.


- Since 1992, SMH has provided homes for hundreds of missionaries.

- Homes range from 540 sq. ft. to 3,000 sq. ft.
- In 2009, we housed 109 people from 17 countries.
- In 2010, we have housed 99 people from 15 countries.
- In 2009, we had to turn away 35 families.
- Gave away \$35,000 of food out of Dad's Country Store.
- We are currently building house #14, the Bill and Sandra Rice House.



Remember years ago, on the first of November we used to receive a big Christmas wish book in the mail from Sears? It was the best book in the world! Being raised in a large family, the Christmas Sears catalog was a way to mark your wishes. We would go through the book and carefully fold the corner of the page down to make sure mom knew what we wanted. Because there were 9 of us, we would put our name next to the item we wanted. Even though my brothers and sisters might not get everything we wanted, it was a time to wish for what seemed to be the impossible.

#### WAYS YOU CAN GET INVOLVED:

The Wreck Center – We have cleared out the old tractor shed and need help to change the façade to look like a gas station and make the inside into a game room. With over 30 kids living at Siloam, we need a game room. We have a ping pong table and other games as well as exercise equipment that we can put into the Wreck Center.

Stone for Driveway – We have about a mile of roads and driveways that need about 2 inches of stone. Through the end of the year, we can purchase stone at a special price of \$1 a running foot, or \$300 for a tandem truckload, which is enough to do 300 ft.

Help Us Build – We are looking for volunteers to help us build. Bring your men's group, Sunday School class and plan a day at Siloam. Volunteer labor saves us thousands of dollars and is a great way to get to know your neighbors and friends.

Building supplies are expensive. Maybe you or the company you work for are looking for a tax write-off for out-of-stock or over runs on building materials. Siloam Missionary



## PERSEVERING Through the STRUGGLES

One observation I have made about the missionary families who stay at Siloam Missionary Homes is that they all have some ongoing issue with which they struggle. Sometimes the issue is physical, such as what one couple has dealt with for quite a long time due to traffic accidents that were not their fault. Cancer has hindered another couple. Unsaved family members, parents not supportive of their missionary calling, parents needing special care, finding churches to which they can present their ministry are a few other continuing concerns of missionary families. (Even getting pastors or missions committees to return calls or acknowledge their contact is a real problem.)

However, as you might think, the most common problem missionaries face is the one most of us deal with — finances. The present economic climate of the country has clearly affected missionary support. Churches feel the impact, but rather than sacrificing some material comfort or fringe benefit, they cut their missionary support. Yet, reaching the world with the Gospel of Christ and leading people to worship the true God is the "business" of the Church. The economy is not the only problem. A church may have supported a particular missionary family for years, but a new pastor may influence the church to drop them from the budget, sometimes for something trivial, as I have observed. A church may begin a building program and "can't afford" to spend money on missions. Thanks be to the Lord, missionaries are willing to sacrifice to share the Savior. (Pardon me, I must move ahead or I may begin to preach!)

Satan attempts to use multitudes of means to prevent people from proclaiming the Gospel as Jesus commanded. He tries to obstruct the work of missionaries, to prevent them from getting to the field, to create scenarios that cause them to leave the field and to add to their struggles. Although this is true, another observation meaningful to me is that regardless of the struggles (sometimes maybe because of the struggles), almost all of the missionaries I have met continue in their determination to fulfill the calling of God on their lives. We are here at Siloam Missionary Homes to provide a place where they can reflect on their calling, rest for a while from their work, refresh their spirits and renew their commitment to ministry. We don't have all the answers for the many issues missionaries face, but we want to encourage missionaries, to help in whatever way we are able. We intend to be faithful in providing "A Place Missionaries Call Home." We always need your help to accomplish this and we are thankful for what you do.

### SILOAM'S TREASURE CHEST

The wall and ceilings on the Rev. Stanley Building's first floor garage should be finished the first week of November. We have replaced windows, improved the lighting, insulated the walls, wired for electrical fixtures and painted the floor. We will add a little heat and set up some area rugs and displays next month. The adjacent work area will be cleared out to add some additional space for sorting new items that arrive.

You may be aware we were open on the day of the Pig Pic'n and we had a yard sale at the I Holt parking lot on Hwy 87 last month. We were able to sell most of the large items that were donated, along with some clothing and household items. After expenses, which were minimal, we made over \$1,600 from these two events!

We have looked at a few locations in town to consider for a permanent location keeping in mind that we will also continue a location at Siloam for the missionary families. But, for now, we have not found the right match or the best timing, and will continue to operate from the store location at Siloam. We will do yard sales when we accumulate enough items, and can be open for visiting groups and consign some antique items to help generate funds for Siloam Missionary Homes. Right now this keeps our expenses very low, providing the most to the ministry.

Once we have completed the store, we will appeal for additional donations. A list of the types of items we need and the condition we like to see will be next on my list. We continue to put aside items needed in the homes and items the missionaries need for their families.

We have initially selected a name for the store – *Siloam's Treasure Chest*. This is still open for discussion.

- God's direction in future endeavors;
- Being a good witness in all the activities surrounding the development of the store;
- Volunteers to help in the store.

### **CARAMEL-APPLE MUFFINS**

- 3 pounds of small Granny Smith Apples
- \* 2 cups sugar
- · 3 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt

Peel, core and cut 4 apples into 24 (1/4 inch thick) rings. Sauté apple rings in a lightly greased skillet, 1 to 2 minutes on each side. Remove from skillet, and place 1 apple ring in the bottom of each of 24 lightly greased muffin pan cups. Peel and finely chop enough remaining apples to equal 3 cups. Set aside. Stir together sugar and next 2 ingredients in a large bowl. Stir together flour and next 3 ingredients; add to sugar mixture, stirring just until blended. (Batter will be stiff) Fold in finely chopped apple. Spoon batter over apple rings in muffin pan cups, filling cups three-fourths full. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until done. Remove muffins from pan and cool on a wire rack. Make sure apple rings face up. Press the handle of a wooden spoon gently into the center of each apple ring, forming a 1-inch deep indentation in the muffins. Spoon warm Quick Caramel Frosting over muffins, filling indentations.


### QUICK CARAMEL FROSTING

- 2 (14 oz.) cans sweetened condensed milk
- ½ cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- ½ cup butter
- · 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Place all ingredients in a heavy 3 quart saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring constantly, over medium low heat. Cook stirring constantly, 3 to 5 minutes or until mixture reaches a pudding like thickness. Remove from heat. Will keep in the refrigerator in an airtight container up to 2 weeks. Just warm over low heat for a few minutes or microwave at HIGH for 15-second intervals until soft.

It was so much fun to just stop for a few hours and play with the kids. Before I know it, they will be all grown up and won't be able to spend as much time with Nana! I treasure these special times.
