

pray this newsletter finds each of you serving the Lord with gladness in your hearts. The above definition came from the dictionary and really, in a couple of sentences, explains what Siloam Missionary Homes is all about — God using you and me to collectively provide missions to the world.

The other day I was with Pastor Pat Fuller and he asked me to list three things by importance that Siloam Missionary Homes provides.

1. Wonderful, beautiful homes in a village setting, completely furnished and ready to move in. The missionary arrives here, tired and in need of a place of rest and to collect their thoughts. A place that is safe for their children to play and not have to worry who they are playing with. All the utilities are on. There is no need to put down large deposits to have the utilities turned on or have to run out and buy furniture — it's all here. Siloam has a beautiful food store where they

can get food to keep from running last minute to the supermarket. Since 2000, over 13 years, God has used His people to provide literally thousands of dollars of food to feed hundreds of missionary families. We also have the Treasure Chest with new and gently used clothing for families and the community.

2. Encouragement to missionaries and to our friends. When God called Joyce and me to start Siloam Missionary Homes back in 1992, we had a vision from the Lord to provide encouragement. When we stepped out of the truck that day and looked at 16,5 acres of total woods and no buildings out in the middle of nowhere, we asked, "Why here?" But in the Bible when Jesus was discouraged, we read that He would go out into the wilderness to spend time with the Lord and pray. A place of solitude. Every day I have people that come out here to tour the campus and one of the things they all say before leaving is, "This place is

- so peaceful and restful." That is step one to encouragement and rest. You can't encourage discouraged people when they are tired, physically and spiritually. Siloam gives them the wonderful opportunity to unwind and allows them to be able to hear God speak.
- 3. Camp Glory Farm is a beautiful place where you can stay and volunteer your services to the Lord. Whether you bring an RV or tent, or stay in one of our Yurts in the Mongolian village, it's all about learning, sharing and then putting these practices into spreading God's glory to the world.

ecently, we've had such an influx of new families arriving at Siloam that it has been a challenge to learn which children go with which family! I'm still trying to master it, but it is always good to see them around the Siloam "village" having fun and making new friends with the other missionary kids. It's also a blessing to Betty and me to get to know the families and become friends with them. Having a missionary family for a meal at our house is one of the best ways we have found to get acquainted with them and for them to know us. Just last evening we had a wonderful time of fellowship and conversation around the dinner table at our house with one of our "new" families. (Did you ever think about how many times the Bible mentions people eating a meal together?)

It's amazing sometimes to think that we have come to know so many missionaries and now we can claim that we have friends "all over the world!" Right now, we have missionaries living at Siloam who have served or will be serving in Ireland, Ecuador, South Africa, Togo, Lithuania, Haiti, Hungary, Colombia, Philippines and Chile. Pray that we who serve at Siloam will know how to be good friends and meet the needs of the missionaries whom God has trusted to our care while they are at "a place missionaries call home."

Once we've come to know them, when families leave Siloam, we miss the fellowship of their friendship. It's often difficult for the children to leave the new friends they have made. One young boy advised his friends not to be missionaries because you have to leave your friends. Another teenager was hard to live with at home because she had to leave her friends in another country.

We know, of course, that is part of the life of a missionary, but stop for a moment and imagine how you would feel to leave your loved ones, to leave friends at church, school, in the neighborhood and even at work and travel to where you know no one. After a time, you make new friends in another country and then a few years pass and you go through the process once more when you have to return to the States. Dealing with separation from loved ones and friends is one aspect of a missionary's life that we should include when we pray for them.

This is only one of the many sacrifices necessary to take the gospel of salvation in Christ to a world that needs Him. How much are we willing to sacrifice to pray, to give, to go and to care for those who are already going?

FROM BETTY'S KITCHEN

Here's a great recipe for summer time.

Hope you enjoy.

EIGHT-LAYER SALAD

- 1 head iceberg lettuce
- 1 head romaine lettuce
- ½ lb. bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 1 small purple onion, chopped or sliced
- 1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen English peas, thawed
- 1 med. Sweet red pepper, sliced or chopped
- 1 (8 oz.) can sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 1-cup sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 3/4 cup sour cream

Tear lettuce into bite-sized pieces. Layer first 8 ingredients in order as listed into a large salad bowl. Combine mayonnaise and sour cream, stirring well; spread over top of salad to sides of bowl to seal the edges. Cover and refrigerate up to 24 hours. Yields 12 servings.
