- The bathhouse needs to be completed at the farm — electrical, insulation, plumbing and drywall.

- We also need to build two 12x12 covered decks and walkways for the yurts.
- > We need to purchase another HV/AC unit for the other yurt.
- > Fence to put up
- > A chicken house to build

Ok...I could go on and on, but I, too, need to be patient. I encourage you to pray and ask God how He can use you to be a part this year. He has promised to help us.

I pray as we work, we can all enjoy the journey along the way. May the Lord bless each of you as we labor together in being that link — providing a wonderful place a missionary can call home.

HIDDEN TREASURES

here are some "hidden treasures" in our little "village" of Siloam Missionary Homes. We encounter the hidden treasures in containers of many sizes, shapes, more than one color and of varied ages from less than a year to early twenties. Of course, we are speaking of the hidden treasures within the children of our missionary family here at Siloam.

Right now, we have 44 MKs (Missionary Kids); probably the largest number here at any time since SMH came into being. Who knows the treasures that may come forth from the lives of those who are "at home" here for a while? Some of the talents, gifts and abilities within their lives are already evident – musically, artistically, socially, academically, physically and otherwise. The personalities and character traits of some give hints of how the Lord may use their lives in the future. Several are already beginning preparations for a lifetime of service. For others, it will be some time before we see a clear direction for their lives.

The hidden treasures reside in these lives, with the potential of being revealed if nurtured, encouraged, trained and allowed to develop through God's molding and polishing. Growing up as an MK has its own unique set of problems. It's difficult enough growing up in one society today, much less dealing with the necessary adjustments to living in more than one society. Pray that they will all know and live for Jesus Christ as their personal Savior and treasure.

Remember to pray for the opening of the hidden treasures found in these lives for God's glory. Also, consider that when you support Siloam Missionary Homes through your prayers, gifts and volunteering your time and efforts, you are helping to create and maintain an environment where for a time, these lives have an opportunity to develop more of their treasures.



FROZEN CRANBERRY SALAD

- 1 can sweetened condensed milk (10 oz.)
- 1 can whole berry cranberry sauce (16 oz.)
- 1 can crushed pineapple, drained (20 oz.)
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 container whipped topping (8 oz.)

In large bowl, combine milk, cranberry sauce, pineapple and nuts. Fold in whipped topping.

Spread in 9 x 13 inch pan or in paper lined cupcake pan. Freeze until firm. Serves 12.
