



## The Essential for Reaching this

Generation - Milton Wilder, Missionary Pastoral Care



Ithough we are not a sending agency, the ministry of Siloam Missionary Homes is helping to fulfill our theme for this year, "Reaching this Generation" through missions. We have a part in meeting a vital need that many missionaries have when returning from their field of service — a place to live while in the States. Siloam is providing missionaries involved in the global mission for Christ "a place for missionaries to call home."

We must do all we can to aid the work that missionaries are doing, and it requires a variety of support ministries like Siloam, as well as many people praying, working and giving sacrificially to make known the message of salvation in Christ around the world. It also requires a great commitment on the part of the church to the task, but first a great commitment to the One who is the subject and commissioner of the task of global missions—Jesus Christ.

The task of reaching this generation through missions necessitates a body of Christ followers assured of the exclusivity of Jesus Christ. That means we believe without doubt that Jesus meant what He said in John 14:6, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me." We are convinced of the truth of what Peter declared in Acts 4:12, "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved."

Paul Borthwick, in his book, Western Christians in Global Mission, writes, "In the classes I teach about global Christianity at Gordon College, a Christian liberal arts institution, more than a third of my students do not believe or are uncertain that people outside of

Jesus Christ are truly lost. And these are students with a predefined interest in global missions....Pluralism...is now the dominant worldview of the common person in North America. The idea that Jesus Christ and Christian faith are unique, a basic motivation for global missions, is far from acceptable in a world that responds to questions of truth with 'all of the above.' The spirit of the age militates against the proclamation that there is no other name by which we can be saved (see Acts 4:12)" (InterVarsity-Press, 2012, p. 71).

Commitment to the truth of Jesus Christ and His exclusive claim of salvation is essential for reaching this generation. Are we willing to stand against "the spirit of the age" and declare at any cost that there is "no other name" except the name of Jesus Christ, "by which we must be saved"?



I am always trying to find quick dishes to serve when having the Missionary families for a meal. The kids always like Mac & Cheese. I found this recipe online and it has been a great recipe to use. This past Friday we had one of the families with eight kids for dinner. They will be leaving us this month and returning to Guam. I served this mac & cheese and there was none left. That is a good referral. Hope you enjoy.

#### Macaroni and Cheese Microwave Casserole

- 3 tablespoons Butter
- 2 Tablespoons Flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- ½ teaspoon dry mustard
- 1½ cups milk
- 2 cups shredded Sharp Cheddar Cheese (optional 1 cup Sharp cheese and 1 cup Velveeta cheese)
- 7 or 8 oz. elbow macaroni, cooked and drained

Melt butter in 1½ quart microwaveable casserole on high about 30 seconds. Blend in flour, salt, mustard. Whisk in milk until well blended. Microwave on high until thickened, about 4 to 6 minutes, stirring once or twice during cooking. Stir in cheese and microwave on high to soften cheese, 30 seconds if needed. Mix in cooked macaroni. Serves 4 to 6. To reheat, microwave on medium high until heated through, 5 to 7 minutes.
