he Classic 1946 movie "It's A Wonderful Life" is one of my favorite Christmas movies and has become a part of our Christmas tradition over the years. When my grandson, David, comes to Papa's house and we want to watch a movie, he will always call out "It's A Wonderful Life, Papa!" Even if it's July. I put the DVD in the player and we sit on the couch and watch the movie. The story is about George Bailey and his family and the loss of a bank deposit that he sees as a scandal to bring down the bank, his family name and his way of life. This all takes place in a small midwestern town called Bedford Falls around the Christmas season. It's about the fact that he wanted to travel and see the world, but the stress of taking care of his father's bank became his way of life.

In a desperate state of despair, George Bailey contemplated jumping off a bridge when an angel appeared in the water crying for help to show George he was needed. George makes a wish afterwards that he had never been born. And so the angel grants his wish. Through a series of events, he then realizes how much he enjoyed life and that he missed his family and friends and wanted to get it all back again.

In writing to you today, I thank the Lord for giving our family the unique privilege of being part of Siloam Missionary Homes. As we close a year of celebrating Siloam's 25th Anniversary, my memory races back to many past Christmases here at Siloam. Because of our faithful partners, and the Lord's help, over

275 missionary families from over 93 different countries have called Siloam Missionary Homes their home, especially at Christmas. I could think of no better place to be at Christmas than this wonderful little missionary village in Snow Camp, North Carolina. Walking around our little town I can see the Merry Christmas sign that once was strung across the M66 highway many years ago in my hometown of Mendon, Michigan now hanging here. That is where the thoughts and idea for a beautiful Christmas were planted in my heart. It was a community of people that not only lived life together, they worshiped together, looked out for each other and loved each other.

I cherish one Christmas when Joyce and I were invited to dinner at one of the missionary familie's homes. We sat in the living room with the lights low, looking at their Christmas tree with all the beautiful wrapped presents under it. Their little children were picking up and shaking presents and trying to guess what was inside. The wife turned to us and with tear-filled eyes quietly said, "This is so wonderful. Last year we sat around a bare tree in our home overseas with very little to give our children for Christmas and look at this. All these presents. Thank the people for giving this for our family!" I wish I could have had all of you with me that day to witness the joys of Christmas.

As Joyce and I walked home that night, hand in hand, there was a sense of excitement, of great joy and thankfulness. The air was crisp, the sky bright with thousands of stars, and we basked in the glow of the evening. Getting into bed, we thanked the Lord for allowing us to witness God's faithfulness. When we see all the glitter, twinkle of lights, missionary children playing and the falling of snow we are reminded of those innocent years as children when we celebrated many Christmases together. None of this can distract us, however, from the Birth of Our Savior and Lord Jesus Christ. If it were not for the willingness of God to send his only Son, Christmas would not have been possible. The Lord Jesus gives us hope, a love for Him and a love to share.

changes lives! What a great thing to hear as our family makes plans to transition to Siloam this next year.



They worked in the Chapel Prayer Rock Garden, replaced the barn roof, landscaped our camp sites, replaced decks on three of our homes, worked on the playground, cleaned up the Wreck Center and Exercise Room equipment...the list goes on and on! 25th Anniversary House Update

In reading Psalms 69, Dr. Adrian Rogers said, "If you were sinking in quicksand, the devil would pat you on the head." Over the past several months we prayed for direction from the Lord to move forward with building the 25th Anniversary House. The foundation and floor had been poured. The rough-in floor plumbing was completed. The well and the septic were ready. Looking at the available funds, we prayed and asked God to help stretch the funds and be with us. After much prayer and conferring with our Board of

Directors, we came to realize that God wanted us to step forward and in faith use the funds we had and to keep going as long as the funds last. We appreciated so much New Covenant Builders' involvement in drawing the blue prints and getting the project off the ground to the point that we can do the project with mostly volunteer labor.

It's been 15 years since I have been deeply involved in a building project, so I felt very overwhelmed. Henry Hagood, our Maintenance Director, and Gary Hodges helped me get things ready for the next step. I called Drew Vaughn at Universal Forrest Products and sat down with him and Cory Moyer to take the floor plan and pre-manufacture all the exterior and interior walls. Gina and Wayne, in contract

sales at Lowe's, contractor Steve Wooten, Mike Rich and Doug Forbis helped figure roof decking, shingles, windows and doors. Then I called Neil Applegate from Wakeshma Community Church in Athens, Michigan to see if he could bring a work team. With all this coming together, I also asked Mike Rich if he could come help us coordinate framing in of the shell and roof. We did all this so we could have it all under roof and protected by winter.

We set a time line, not knowing if anyone could come, if the weather would be clear and if manufacturing could get the walls built in time. The date to begin was planned for Monday, October 16, 2017. We were taking the first step... "Lord we need you!"

STEP 1

- October 15th Mike Rich arrived to help get everything ready to begin work on Monday.
- October 16th it rained until 11 that morning. We picked up the bathtub from Carolina Supply (Thank you Doug Shoffner and Chris Moise at Carolina Supply who donated the tub. Praise the Lord!) The work team from Michigan arrived that evening about 5:00 PM.
- October 17th The walls arrived at 8:30 am. They began to put the walls up in sunny skies and beautiful weather.
- October 18th Mike and I went to see Kevin Langley with a shopping list of exterior doors that we needed. Kevin has a ministry to help ministries like ours. We were able to get all of the exterior doors and one special window we needed at no cost and headed back to the project. Do I hear an AMEN? (No Cost!! PTL)

- October 19th The work team finished all the exterior and interior walls and wrapped the house with weather wrap. They also worked on a couple of window and door openings.
- October 20th The work team headed back to Michigan with a job well done.

This week has been a true hand of God at work. All the exterior and interior walls are up and ready for the next step. All of the roof decking paper and shingles are here (Paid For PTL!)

A Special Praise - to date everything is paid for as we move on to Step 2.

STEP 2

- October 24th the windows arrive (Paid for PTL)
- October 27th The roof trusses arrive (Paid For PTL)
- October 30th 8:00 am we will put up trusses and roof decking and paper. (paid for PTL)

Each year at Christmas, we all like to have simple but great recipes to share with family and friends. Last year I made this simple candy and because Milton loves peanut butter and chocolate, this hit the spot with him. Hope you enjoy and have a very Merry Christmas as you celebrate our Savior's birth.

- 24 ounces white almond bark
- ½ cup crunchy or creamy peanut butter
- 1 cup semi sweet chocolate chips (milk chocolate will work fine too)

Line a rimmed baking sheet with waxed paper. Set aside. In a large mixing bowl, break up almond bark as best you can. Place bowl in microwave for about one minute. Stir well. Microwave at 30-second intervals, stirring after each, until bark is melted and smooth. Stir in peanut butter until melted and well blended. Spread out onto waxed paper lined baking pan. Place chocolate chips in a small bowl and microwave at 30-second intervals, stirring after each, until smooth and melted. Drop dollops of chocolate onto peanut butter mixture in pan. Swirl with a knife. Place baking sheet in refrigerator until hardened or allow to harden completely at room temperature. Break into pieces and store in airtight container.

I have continued to love that place, the people, the flag...its part of who I am. It is part of the "desire of my heart." In the first 16 years of our marriage, I longed to be back there, in ministry. My heart was broken and I got to the point that I asked God to take that desire away. BUT GOD had a plan, a purpose for my life. Jer. 29:11, "for I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord..." After Larry got saved, the Lord began to do a work in his heart that there was something for us to do. God was putting a desire in his heart. When he came home that Saturday morning and asked me about providing homes for missionaries, it was as if the light came on and I was excited! God's plan and purpose for me - the desire He had put in my heart was being fulfilled.
