Serving the Lord often requires us to take paths that we never expected and that appear, from a human perspective, to be unmarked trails. But God is faithful and always leads us in the way we should go. Our family is a living testimony to the providence of God. Over twenty years ago my wife and I obeyed the calling of God in our lives and surrendered to go to the mission field of Quebec with the intention of planting churches for the rest of our lives. Nearly ten years and three children later we were poised for our move to Canada, but God had a different plan for us.

Just like we see with the apostle Paul, God's children are not guaranteed life without pain or sorrow. The detour in our lives was the result of my wife contracting Lyme disease a second time. The months that followed were times of uncertainty as we tried to maintain our support while figuring out how to deal with the effects of the disease. Ultimately we took a medical leave of absence and I took a job working in the corporate world. This was challenging on many fronts, including our desire to serve the Lord. We could just sit around bemoaning the fact that we weren't on the mission field or we could get involved in our local church, and by the grace of God, we chose the latter. In the last ten years God has allowed me to minister as an interim pastor, volunteer worship leader and Sunday School teacher. On the business front He has allowed me to serve on two nonprofit boards including a local chamber of commerce. While we were not aware of what God was doing, He was perfectly preparing us for the next step in our lives.

Early last year I had the privilege of joining the board at Siloam Missionary Homes as the vice-chair with the intention of potentially joining the staff at some point in the future. The last year has been such a blessing, getting to know Larry and Joyce and falling in love with the ministry here at Siloam. At the board meeting in January the board voted for me to join the staff early next year as the next director at Siloam and allow Larry and Joyce to transition from the day-to-day operations while remaining active in ministry, just in a different role. I have been spending Mondays in the office for about a month and have to say that it does make the rest of the week seem a little dull. I stand amazed that the great God we serve can take our detour and bring us to the place of His choosing in His time. We as a family cannot wait to call Siloam our home, as so many missionaries have before us, and are grateful for the support of Larry and Joyce and the board in taking this next step in our lives.



For Such A Time As This

bout 483 years before Christ, the Jews living in the Persian Empire faced extermination because of a plot by Haman, an official under King Ahasuerus. The account unfolds in the Old Testament book of Esther, an orphaned Jewish woman who, through the sovereignty of God, had become queen of Persia! When Mordecai, who had raised her (his uncle's daughter), learned of the king's edict of genocide, his message to Esther was, "For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another place and you and your father's house will perish [because she was Jewish, unknown at that time to the king]. And who knows whether you have not attained royalty for such a time as this?" Esther 4:14.

From those words comes Siloam's theme for the year: "For Such a Time as This," applied to our own present situation. What a time this is! Listen to and watch the news on TV or online, read the newspaper, etc., 24/7. Good things are taking place, but the headlines are of death and destruction, crime and chaos, immorality and ISIS, wars and rumors of wars. Don't we need more Esthers for such a time as this?

It was evident that God chose Esther for such a time as she faced, a time when her courage to act preserved God's people through whom the Messiah, Jesus would come.

Is it not also evident that part of God's plan for such a time as this is choosing some of His people to send out as missionaries? This is a time when their courage to act brings people to God through proclaiming Jesus, the one and only Messiah who brings forgiveness, hope and eternal life.

Who knows whether the missionaries whom God has sent to the world might present the gospel to someone whom God may use as He used Esther?

For such a time as this, God has equipped us who have become His people through Jesus Christ, with the resources to enable those He has chosen to go as missionaries. He calls us to pray and give, as well as to go to those around us.

But the task is so great, the world is so big, the need so overwhelming that we wonder how we can make a difference. Esther acted. Even if we have little to give, it can make a difference. What difference can we make if we do nothing? We don't have to wait until we can do great things like Esther, before we do something to meet the needs.








Mars Hill Baptist Church brought a group out to help us trim, pull weeds and freshen up the entrance way.





We have used this cookie recipe ever since we started having work teams at Siloam, back in 1993. I believe we got the recipe from Larry's sister, Mary Ann. It is a winner! Every time we share them with friends, they ask for the recipe. Enjoy!

Monster Cookies

- 1 c. butter
- 2-1/2 c. brown sugar
- 2 c. white sugar
- 6 eggs
- 1-1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1-1/2 lbs. peanut butter
- 1-1/2 tsp. karo syrup

Cream together & add:

- 4 tsp. baking soda
- 9 cups oatmeal (instant)
- 1 pound chocolate chips
- 1 pound M&M's

Drop by rounded spoon full onto cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 8 - 10 minutes. Do not over bake.
