
From the Mailbag

RECIPE Carrot-Pineapple Cake

At our last Bible Study before summer break started, I had the group at Siloam for lunch. Several of the ladies asked me to put the recipe for the cake I served in the next newsletter. It is a moist cake that is a little different from regular carrot cake. Hope you enjoy!

Carrot-Pineapple Cake

- · 3 c All-Purpose flour
- · 2 c Sugar
- · 2 tsp. Baking powder
- · 2 tsp. Ground Cinnamon
- · 1 tsp. Baking soda
- · 1/2 tsp. Salt
- · 1 (15 oz.) can Crushed Pineapple
- · 2 c Carrots, finely shredded
- · 1 c Vegetable oil
- · 4 Eggs
- · 2 tsp. Vanilla

Grease and flour 9 x 13 pan or three 8-inch cake pans. In a large mixing bowl stir together all the dry ingredients, add undrained pineapple, carrots, oil, eggs and vanilla. Mix with large spoon or mix on low speed with hand mixer. Do not over mix. Bake at 350 degrees about 35 minutes or until done. Cool and then frost with Cream Cheese Frosting.

Dear Coffee Club Members,

n the past 26 years, God has sent over 300 missionary families to us from 97 different countries around the world. Some have spent just a few days with us and we didn't really get a chance to know them. Some have spent a year or more with us and we have had a chance to sit down with them and hear their story — about how God called them into the ministry and about their passion and love for the people they work with.



So far in 2018, we have had 17 families stay here at Siloam Missionary Homes. Some have already left to return to the field. Some are still here with us. Let me tell you about some of them.

Gene and Gina came to us at the beginning of the school year. They are from South Korea and are serving in the Philippines. They have been here in the US to rest and spend time reporting to churches. While they were here, they discovered that their oldest son was dealing with childhood diabetes. Although the doctor wanted to put him on insulin, the family prayerfully decided to control it with prayer, diet and exercise. Today, his blood levels are normal and they are headed back to the mission field — rested and healthy.

James and Deanna have served in China and Tanzania. Although they still have a desire to do mission work, they feel that the Lord is leading them to stay here in the US for this season of their lives to help their adult children settle in. They plan to make short term trips to continue to stay connected with their mission work.

James and Andrea arrived in the US with a very limited understanding of the English language. They are from Brazil, serving as missionaries in Thailand. After two years on the mission field, because the Thai language is very difficult to learn if you don't know English, it was decided that they should come and spend some time in the US to learn English. They have been attending classes at Alamance Community College as well as spending time with Larry and me just speaking conversational English. It has been a very rewarding experience helping them learn "what is the difference between 'bear' and 'bare'?" and other words that sound the same but have different meanings... We never realized how many words in our language are like that!!

Santiago and Jackie serve with Pathway College Ministries locally, where they go onto college campuses and try to reach out to the students. They probably will not be here at Siloam for very long as they plan to settle in the area permanently.

Jason and Anita are in airplane mechanic and flight training at a local mission agency. They are working toward going to Central America as missionaries, once their training is complete.

Keith and Jennifer are also with the aviation ministry, here to complete their training.

Mario and Giovana, founders of MORE International and MORE USA, have just recently moved onto our campus and will be continuing to raise funds for and operate their ministry to the suffering church around the world.

Ben and Catherine were with us for almost a year, and have recently left to go and help with her aging parents. Their desire is to return to the mission field, but because of her parents' health, they are going to take a sabbatical to help them and help with decisions that need to be made regarding their care.

Several other families have spent time here at Siloam this year, and we have more who will be coming. As you can see just from these few, ministry is taking place all over the world and in all different ways. Thank you for your prayers for us as we try to make a difference in each family's life. Thank you for your financial support that helps make it possible to minister to them. We welcome our newest Coffee Club members, John and Molly Breedlove.
