10 REASONS WHY

Missionaries Need Siloam Missionary Homes

ave you ever wondered where a missionary lives while raising support, going to or returning from the field, needing a place to rest, a place to grieve, a place to put the family back together again, transitioning off the field or into retirement? Why does a missionary need Siloam Missionary Homes?

- 1. IT'S ECONOMICAL. The average cost of a 2-3 bedroom house in our area is \$900-\$1200 a month; Siloam is \$400-\$450.
- **2. IT'S FELLOWSHIP.** We encourage fellowship by monthly family style dinners, going to a ballgame, Lunch at Betty's and other events.
- 3. IT'S PRAYING FOR EACH OTHER. Every weekday morning at 8:00, we gather together and pray for the needs of our missionaries, families and friends around the world.
- 4. IT'S FOOD. Our food pantry, "Dad's Country Store" provides approximately \$55,000 of food each year to our missionary families. This food is given by our friends like you.
- 5. IT'S CLOTHING. The Treasure Chest, a 1200 sq. building, provides gently used clothing for our missionary families. Each year thousands of dollars worth of new and used clothing are given to Siloam Missionary Homes.
- **6. IT'S SECURITY.** We are a gated community, looking out for our missionary kids and their families.
- 7. IT'S ENCOURAGEMENT. No one understands the life of a missionary more than another missionary family. We have found this to be a bond that encourages them to keep going.

- 8. IT'S KID FRIENDLY. We have 3 playgrounds, a game room and 33½ acres for the kids to play.
- **9. IT'S HEALTHY.** We have hiking trails, a full exercise room, and bikes for everyone to use while living here.
- 10. IT'S BIBLICAL. The Bible tells us to take care of our brother and sisters. 3 John 6-8 Helping to meet the needs of the saints Romans 12:13 Distributing to the necessity of saints; given to hospitality Hebrews 6:10 God blesses those who give.

IT'S BECAUSE OF YOU

The evangelist D. L. Moody once said, "The world has yet to see what God can accomplish through someone who is totally dedicated to serving him." That statement is still true today.

One large mission organization has calculated that it takes the average missionary couple 26 months, 40,000 miles and \$30,000 to get to the field first time (Remember, this was written in 1982!).

How often have we ignored the truth? We often go through our daily routines never thinking of the vapor of life that we live. James 4:14, "Yet you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. You are just a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away." (NASB) If we could just take a moment and recognize how a vapor is so quickly gone, then perhaps we would see the importance of using every moment we live to its fullest.

I recently saw a war movie, based on a true story, and the main character had such focus on what he was called to do. In the movie, Desmond Doss was going to be sent to prison for refusing to handle a gun in war. Regardless of what everyone around him said, he held fast to his faith and promises he had made to God. He stated, "I don't know how I am going to live with myself if I don't stay true to what I believe." His passion to be obedient to God regardless of the cost was overwhelming to me.

How often, in my own life, do I tend to try and remove myself from a painful situation by giving excuses or running away? Do I avoid sticking to my commitments to God in the chance of being ridiculed by others? Towards the end of the movie, one more phrase stands out that really says it all. In the very midst of the battle, knowing that his job as unarmed medic could cost him his life at any moment, he prays, "Please Lord, help me get one more, help me get one more." Do we live our lives with that prayer? Are we willing to go into the battlefield of life and risk our own for reaching just one more for Christ? I John 3:16, "We know love by this, that He laid down His life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren." (NASB) Not only did Doss save American lives, he also helped save several of the enemy's lives as well. He wasn't trapped by any form of prejudice, only in the truth that every life was worth saving.

Total surrender to serve God requires complete obedience to His leading, regardless of location, color, gender, or differences. It is seeing others through the eyes of Christ and having a broken heart for the lost. May our prayer be, "Please Lord, help me get one more, help me get one more."

This is a great recipe to carry to a covered dish meal or just have on hand for a side dish. Hope you enjoy!


Marinated Vegetable Salad

- ¾ Cup Vinegar
- 1/2 Cup Vegetable Oil
- 1 cup Sugar
- 1 tsp. Salt
- 1 T. Water
- 1 (16 oz.) can English Peas
- 1 (14 oz.) can Shoe Peg Corn
- 1 (2 oz.) can Chopped Pimiento
- 1 cup Chopped Celery
- 1 Green Pepper, finely chopped
- · 1 Onion, Chopped
- 1 (16 oz.) can French-Style Green Beans
- 1 (16 oz.) can Kidney Beans or Pinto Beans

Combine first 6 ingredients in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring to dissolve sugar. COOL. Drain vegetables.

Combine vegetables and stir in vinegar mixture. Cover and place in refrigerator for at least 12 hours, stirring occasionally.

Will keep for days in the refrigerator!
