TRANSITION by H. Milton Wilder, Missionary Pastoral Care

Tran • si • tion: "a process or period in which something undergoes a change and passes from one state, stage, form, or activity to another."

This is a definition of what missionaries often face as they move from one country to another or change locations within a country. Try to imagine what "culture shock" is like; learning to communicate in another language, adjusting to different customs, meeting people, some with hostility toward "foreigners." The list goes on when transitioning to another country to follow God's calling.

At Siloam, we are on "the other end" of transition (with a few exceptions), when missionaries return after having been away for maybe several years and must readjust to life back "home." Try to imagine what "reverse culture shock" is like. The changes in our

country are much more evident to those returning who have not experienced the changes gradually as we have.

Being able to plan for a life transition is most helpful, but sometimes circumstances develop that force missionaries into an unexpected return to the States. Changing cultures with preparation is difficult enough, but suddenly, they must struggle to adjust without the opportunity for planning their transition.

For example, in recent months armed conflict in the street where they lived forced one missionary family to evacuate their home and country and find a place at Siloam. At present, a couple is staying at Siloam who, learning of imminent danger, within 24 hours packed what they could and returned to the States in order to avoid arrest by the government. Issues with family back home as well as events on the field, often create the need for a quick return. Sometimes these unanticipated situations require missionaries to change ministries, thus creating another necessary transition.

There is much more to the subject of missionary transition. Perhaps this is enough for you to see why we ask you to make it a focus of your prayers as we care for the missionaries at Siloam.

NEW BEGINNINGS




We have the privilege of meeting and ministering to many missionaries at different stages of their journey in service for the Lord. As I consider the missionaries I have been honored to interact with here at Siloam, I am reminded of the Lord's calling to His disciples. In the book "The Training of the Twelve" by A. B. Bruce he says this about the first disciples and their faith, "...its value lay not in maturity, or accuracy, but in this, that however imperfect, it brought them into contact and close fellowship with Him, in whose company they were to see greater things than when they first believed..."

Their faith was tested as their beautiful newborn came into this world with a physical issue, but God in His providence placed them here where they could receive excellent care from the top-notch doctors available in this area.

BETTY'S RECIPE Cinnamon Cheesecake

I hope everyone has had a great summer and tried some new recipes. Here at Siloam we had several work groups over the summer. This dessert is always a favorite with the groups. I shared it several years ago but had a request that I share it again. It is super easy and always a hit.

Cinnamon Cheesecake

- · 2 pkgs. Refrigerated crescent rolls
- · 2 (8 oz.) pkgs. cream cheese
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Spread 1 pkg. of crescent rolls in bottom of 13 x 9 pan. Mix together cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Spread over rolls. Spread second pkg of crescent rolls over cream cheese mixture.

Topping

- 1 stick butter, melted
- 1/2 cup sugar
- · 3 tsp. cinnamon

Mix the three ingredients together and pour over the cream cheese and rolls. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

I am really excited about having them here and pray that our staff and the other missionary families living on campus can be a blessing to them.
