To God be the glory — He sent us an amazing group of godly men from Mount Pisgah United Methodist

Church in Greensboro. Their Emergency Response
Team took on this project and in just over three
days replaced the rotted center beam supporting
the floor joists, repaired the floor joists, patched and
strengthened the outer rim bands, and patched the
floor sheathing. They did it with a spirit of fellowship
and love for our Savior that perfectly exemplified the
passage from I Timothy 6. They may have been working
on a physical foundational structure for a house, but
in reality they were laying up for themselves a spiritual
foundation – and doing so humbly and with a spirit of
worship and encouragement.

We praise the Lord for volunteers such as these who are willing to be used of the Lord to keep this ministry moving forward and make sure that we get this house back open for a family as quickly as possible.

Camp Glory Farm Update

Hello and Goodbye

Lambing season is now over-just like that. Usually the "normal" lambing season doesn't commence until early to mid-January. This year, however, we decided to breed all of the sheep early with the hope of having most of the lambs born before the end of the year. This made for a not so normal and very busy Christmas. We bred a total of twelve sheep and three goats giving us the potential of at least twelve lambs and three kids.



The first part of lambing season would have had zero complications except one sheep had complication

after complication. We were told by the vet her problem would be solved after she gave birth and when she finally did give birth, she surprised us with twins. We were expecting one very large baby, not two! Unfortunately, her problem was not fixed and for a period of time she was unable to care for her lambs. After several visits to the vet, we were able to get her the right medication and care until she was strong enough to care for her lambs. Thankfully, the rest of lambing season went great and we have twenty-five happy, healthy little ones running around. We love watching them run back and forth in a giant flock.

In addition to welcoming the new babies into this world, we had to say goodbye to one of our alpacas, Ovation, due to declining health issues. We believed he had a tumor growing in his chest. We were sad to see him go and will miss his presence here on the farm. Alpacas usually have goofy looks on their faces, and he always seemed to be smiling. Just looking at his face always brought a smile to ours.





We are excited for the things to come for Camp Glory Farm in 2021. Other than raising sheep for meat. the overall purpose of Camp Glory Farm will be further explored. The number one purpose of the farm has always been to be a ministry to the missionary kids. This year, we are going to further develop our plans centered on the missionary children. We have begun offering an introductory class for the families living on campus that informs and directs them in their interactions with the animals. This has given our families the opportunity to spend hands-on time with the animals when it is more convenient for their schedules. We are also able to interact more with the families.

Camp Glory Farm @ Watson's Place

The last few years have been focused on repairs and updating on the farm house and property. The renovations on the house are complete, and it has been so nice living in a house that does not have continuous construction in one part or another. But, just because the house is finished, does not mean construction at Watson's is complete. Along with the house, there are ten acres of land that go with it. Currently, only a small portion of the land has been developed into an area for the sheep. Right now, we are contemplating exactly what should be done about the barns. The barns at Watson's Place are a sad sight and are not really usable for the animals right now. The barn at on the main campus at Siloam is fairly small and can become quite crowded during lambing season. So our biggest dream right now is to have a bigger, nicer barn for the animals at Watson's Place. However, we know God has His plan and it will come to fruition in His time and His way!



Before COVID the idea for Camp Glory Farm @ Watson's Place was to be an outreach to the local schools. School children would be able to come on field trips and we would be able to reach kids and give them the

hope of Christ from The Shepherd's perspective. This has, unfortunately, been put on hold at the present. We are currently praying that restrictions would open up this opportunity or that we would find another way for Watson's Place to be an outreach. A lot of work and development is happening, but we are still excited for the future. Please continue to pray for Camp Glory Farm and what the Lord has in store.

BETTY'S RECIPE



This chocolate cake made with mayonnaise and staples that are in your pantry, is a great, moist cake. (Milton loved it!)

Chocolate-Mayonnaise Cake

- · 2 cups all-purpose flour
- · 2/3 cup unsweetened cocoa
- · 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon table salt
- ¼ teaspoon baking powder
- · 3 large eggs
- · 1 2/3 cups firmly packed light brown sugar
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 1/3 cups hot water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk together flour and next 5 ingredients in a medium bowl. Grease and flour a 13 x 9 inch pan. Beat eggs, sugar and vanilla at medium high speed with an electric mixer about 3 minutes or until mixture is very light brown. Add mayonnaise and beat at low speed until combined. Add flour mixture to egg mixture alternately with hot water, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Beat at low speed just until blended after each addition. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool completely before spreading your favorite Chocolate Frosting on cake.
