Maintaining Focus

uring his illustrious ministry proclaiming the Gospel throughout Asia Minor (and beyond) Paul was presented many different opportunities for ministry. In I Corinthians 2 he shares that he came to them, not with fancy speeches or sophisticated philosophy, but with one simple message – Jesus Christ and His crucifixion. His background and authority resulted in opportunities to be distracted from the main purpose of his ministry – which was to proclaim the Gospel. He regularly had to guard against getting away from his primary mission.

Here at Siloam Missionary Homes our primary mission since 1992 has been to provide housing for missionaries with a secondary focus on providing a community setting that promotes spiritual, physical, and emotional healing. Our mission is accomplished through a faithful group of staff, our board, volunteers, and financial supporters. Since our founding, many different programs have been put in place, all with good intentions, though at times decisions had to be made to shift or end some of those programs. We have come to one of those times.

Nearly fourteen years ago the Lord opened the door to purchase the seven-acre property west of our main community. At that time a process began that ultimately led to using that property as a campground and housing for our volunteers, but also a small farm with the intent of teaching farming and gardening methods to the missionary families. We have seen fruit from that investment as several young people have been interns or learned hard work and farming techniques. We even

had one staff member transition from an intern to a staff member. But as time has passed, the original plan of using the farm as a learning experience for the missionaries has not developed as we had hoped, and the farm has begun to distract our focus from our primary mission—which is housing for the missionaries. So, the board of directors has made the difficult decision to end the farm operations and sell the animals. We will continue to use Camp Glory for events and short-term camping for missionaries and volunteers, and we do hope that someday we can add some more permanent short-term (one to two week) accommodations to meet a growing need among missionaries.

So, what does that mean for you, our prayer partners and supporters? It means we are committed to doing the thing that Siloam was founded to do – minister to the missionaries through housing and the community environment on our main campus. We will see to the myriad of maintenance needs that are coming up over the next few years, as well as seek to enhance the missionary experience for all future residents at Siloam. Please pray that God will help us during this reset period and prepare us for future opportunities that align with our primary work and mission.

We are thankful for your prayers and support. If you haven't been to Siloam recently, please consider stopping by (and even volunteering) as we have much to do as we head into the fall.

The Ministry of Listening

e have the privilege of being able to talk to our heavenly Father anytime, but sometimes we need a fellow human being with whom we can discuss our personal situation. now," or even, "I know what I'm going to do," or similar comments I have heard after a conversation. Of course, not every "listening session" is simple. Sometimes continuing to wait on God's answer is the outcome, but it's amazing how often listening actively to a person can produce a therapeutic result—and is part of the ministry available to the missionaries and staff at Siloam.

There's not enough space to talk more about listening, but Ecclesiastes 3:7 reminds us that there is "A time to be silent and a time to speak." James tells us, "everyone must be quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger" (3:7). It is essential for all of us to be good listeners to the One who spoke all things into existence "and upholds all things by the word of His power" (Hebrews 1:3). We can "hear" His words speak to our hearts in the Book He gave us that has an undetermined number of words, more than 783,000. "God, after He spoke long ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son..." (Hebrews 1:1-2). Are we good listeners?

BETTY'S RECIPE



MEXICAN RICE CASSEROLE

Ingredients:

- 1 Pound Ground Beef
- 1 Small Onion, Diced

Salt & Pepper, To Taste

- 1 package Taco Seasoning
- 1 Teaspoon Garlic Powder
- 1 Cup Long Grain White Rice
- 1 1/2 Cups Beef Broth
- 1 15 Ounce Can Corn, Drained
- 8 Ounces Tomato Sauce
- 1 10 ounce can Ro Tel diced tomatoes
- & green chilies
- 1 Cup Shredded Cheese

Directions:

Cook the ground beef and onion together with salt and pepper to taste in a large skillet over medium high heat until beef is no longer pink. Drain grease if necessary. Return the pan to the stove and sprinkle the beef with the garlic powder and taco seasoning.

Stir in the rice, broth, corn, tomato sauce, and Ro Tel. Bring mixture to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer for 18-20 minutes until rice is tender.

Top with cheese and return the lid to the pan for 2-3 minutes until cheese is melted. May be served with chips or salad and you can add Salsa if you like.
